

You are Invited to a Public Open House

The Flood Control District of Maricopa County (District) invites you to an Open House to view the preliminary study results of limited detail delineations of floodplains (without floodway) along nine miles of selected watercourses, in addition to the results in a Distributary Flow Study Area, in the Wittmann area. The study area is located in northwestern Maricopa County, and bounded by U.S. Highway 60 on the north and Patton Road on the south (see the map at right).

The study has delineated new floodplains based on detailed topography (land elevation) using currently accepted study methods. The Distributary Flow Study Area shows the potential for shallow "sheet flow" flooding due to the lack of clearly defined natural wash channels.

About Floodplain Delineations

The Flood Control District of Maricopa County participates in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) by identifying and managing the floodplains for unincorporated Maricopa County and 13 municipalities. The District conducts floodplain delineation studies to identify areas that are subject to flood inundation by a 100-year flood (one percent chance of occurring in any given year). The resulting floodplain maps are used for floodplain management purposes and are submitted to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) for revisions to their Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRM).
